27th IASLIC National Seminar, 2016: Brief Report

The 27th IASLIC National Seminar, 2016 was organized by Pt. Sundarlal Sharma Library and School of Studies in Library and Information Science, Pt. Ravishankar University, Raipur, during December 22-24, 2016. The theme of the seminar was *Social Networking and Libraries*. The seminar was inaugurated on December 22, 2016 in the gracious presence of Dr. Shiv Kumar Pandey, Vice-chancellor, Pt. Ravishankar University, Raipur; Dr. Naresh Dadhich, Former Director, Inter-University Centre for Astronomy and Astrophysics, Pune; Dr. Barun Mukherjee, President IASLIC & Former MP; and Prof. Pijushkanti Panigrahi, General Secretary, IASLIC. Dr. Suparna Sengupta, Organizing Secretary of the seminar welcomed the guests and participants.

The Governing Body Meeting of IASLIC was held on the same day, in which the Annual Report and Audited Statement of Accounts for the year 2015-2016 and the annual budget for the year 2017-2018 were adopted and the theme and venue of 31st All India Conference of IASLIC, 2018 were approved. In the same meeting counting of votes for IASLIC Election, 2017-19 was conducted.

Thematic sessions took place on December 23 and 24, 2016. Prof. A K Verma, Retired Professor & Head, School of Studies in Library and Information Science, Pt. Ravishankar University, was the Director of the thematic sessions. During the two days, five technical sessions and two Special Interest Group meetings were held. Papers were presented under sub-themes *Social Media: concept and function, Opportunities and challenges of using social media in Library and Information Services (LIS) and Social Networking in LIS education* during these technical sessions.

Special Interest Group meeting *SIG01: Social Sciences Information* was held on the theme *Customer Satisfaction Management in Library and Information Services*. Seven papers were presented in two sessions. Special Interest Group meeting *SIG02: Computer Application in LIS* was held on the theme *Mobile Technology in Libraries*. In this SIG meeting also seven papers were presented in two sessions.

Each paper presented during the technical sessions as well as SIG meetings was followed by discussions, observations, and comments.

The Annual General Meeting of IASLIC was held on December 23, 2016 at Pt. Sundarlal Sharma Library. The meeting was presided over by Dr. Barun Mukherjee. At the outset, one-minute silence was observed to pay respect to the IASLIC members who had passed away during the previous year, viz., Shri S K Kapur, Prof. Ashok Basu, Dr. U. M. Thakur and Prof. Dibyendu Paul. During this meeting, the proceedings of the 57th Annual General Meeting and the Annual Report for the year 2015-2016 were adopted. The members were informed that the 31st All India Conference of IASLIC would be held at Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi. The

meeting also approved *Public Libraries in India in 21st Century* as the theme of the conference. Finally, the results of the elections for the period 2017-19 were declared by the Election Officer Dr. Shyamal Roy Choudhury.

The valedictory function was held on December 24, 2016 at Pt. Sundarlal Sharma Library, which was presided over by Dr. Shiv Kumar Pandey, Vice-chancellor, Pt. Ravishankar University, Raipur. Dr. Aditya Tripathi, Rapporteur General of the Seminar, presented the detailed report of the seminar. Prof. Maya Verma, Head, School of Studies in Library and Information Science, Pt. Ravishankar University, Raipur, proposed the vote of thanks.

Dubai to build largest e-Library

The Ruler of Dubai Sheikh Mohammed Bin Rashid Al-Maktoum has issued a law to establish a one billion dirham (USD 272 million) library with two million e-books, making it the world's largest electronic collection, UAE state news agency WAM has reported. A board, which will have to plan the construction of the library, will also be drawing up general policies and strategic plans required to deliver the library's objectives. Renderings of the planned library indicate that its architecture will have the shape of a book. Spreading over one million square feet, the facility will include eight specialized libraries, can accommodate 42 million visitors annually and will host over 100 annual cultural events. "We want this library to serve as a cultural forum, an incubator for knowledge and a civilization centre in the region," said His Highness Sheikh Mohammed. Four-Year old Librarian of LC

A four-year-old girl, who has read more than 1,000 books, has become the "librarian for a day" at the world's largest library in the US, says a PTI report published in *The Times of India*. Daliyah Arana, who is from Gainesville, Georgia, joined Librarian of Congress Carla Hayden who made history in 2016 when she became the first female and the first African-American to hold the position. Arana became the first-ever librarian for the day at the US Library of Congress on January 11, the ABC reported. Hayden and Arana sat in on meetings, met with library staff and roamed the many halls of the library. Arana also suggested the library to add whiteboards to the walls so that children could practice their writing, which library officials said they were considering. Talking Library set up in Nashik

Four days after International Braille Day, celebrated on January 4, the visually challenged people in Nashik received a 'Talking Library' as a gift, says a report published in The Times of India. Om Sai Welfare Association for the Blind and Disabled, a nongovernmental organisation for visually challenged people, has started the first ever library of talking books at their Nashik Road office. The library was inaugurated by DCP (Crime) Dattatreya Karale. "The library has three types of services - books based on digital accessible information system (DAISY), books recorded in MP3 format and e-books that can be read with the talk-back software," said president of the organization, Vikas Shejwal. The books recorded in MP3 format will be accessible for the people even on their cellphones and MP3 players. "It's going to be a free service for visually challenged people. We have recorded textbooks from Std X to different post-graduate courses in MP3 format. Books for competitive examinations like MPSC, UPSC and banking are also available in Marathi, English and Hindi," Shejwal said. Library set on fire

A sacked contract employee of Gulbarga University was arrested recently for setting the university's library building on fire, says a *The Times of India* report. Thousands of books worth several lakhs have been burnt in the incident which happened just two days prior to the university's convocation. Police has nabbed the accused Shivkumar Pattedar, a resident of Kusanoor village, with the help of CCTV footage which showed him wandering near the library building. Sub-inspector Raghavendra of the University police station said that "Shivkumar worked as an attendant in the library on a contract basis and was sacked a couple of months ago for his inefficiency. Shivakumar wanted to avenge his sacking. He gained entry into the library through a window after climbing a tree beside the building and set the books on fire", he added. Open access book revenue poised to go up

While the movement to unlock the vaults of scientific, technical and medical (STM) research is revolutionizing academic journal publishing, scholarly and professional book publishers are experimenting with open models simply to keep the venerable monograph from extinction, according to the most recent report from media and publishing intelligence firm Simba Information. The report, Open Access Book Publishing 2016-2020, found that there was promise in this strategy. According to the report, while both STM and social science and humanities (SSH) book revenue is expected to decline at a compound annual rate of about 1% between 2016 and 2020, open access (OA) book revenue is expected to grow by almost 30% a year through 2020. E-book lending to be treated as print-book lending: EU Court

The lending of an electronic book (ebook) can be treated in the same way as that of a traditional book under certain conditions, Europe's highest court has said. The Court of Justice of the European Union (CJEU) was ruling on VerenigingOpenbareBibliotheken v StichtingLeenrecht, referred by the District Court of The Hague, in the Netherlands. Currently in the Netherlands, the lending of ebooks by public libraries does not fall under the public lending regime applicable to traditional books. Libraries make e-books available to the public via the Internet, on the basis of licensing agreements with rights owners, says the court's press release. VerenigingOpenbareBibliotheken, an association to which every public library in the Netherlands belongs, brought an action against StichtingLeenrecht, a foundation that collects royalties owed to authors and other rights owners. Vereniging had taken the view that "the regime for traditional books should also apply to digital lending", so it brought the claim against Stichting, seeking a declaratory judgment to that effect. According to the release, the action concerned lending under the 'one copy, one user' model, where users can download only one copy onto their own computer during the lending period. A new *Guidelines, Standards and Outcome Measures for Australian Public Libraries* was launched at a gala dinner at Parliament House in Canberra recently. Record number of e-books borrowed in USA

A record number of readers turned to their local library and school to enjoy e-books and audiobooks in USA during 2016. According to OverDrive, the leading digital reading platform for libraries and schools, readers borrowed 196 million digital books, an increase of 21 per cent over 2015. Of the 678 million visits to library and school websites, readers borrowed more e-books (+16%) and audiobooks (+34%) from their local and school libraries digital catalogue compared to last year. Highlights of record-setting growth from the OverDrive global network are: total digital titles borrowed from libraries and schools - 195 million (+21%); e-book circulation - 139 million (+16%); Audiobook circulation -55 million (+34%); 49 library systems achieved at least 1 million digital checkouts; Visits to OverDrive-powered library and school websites - 678 million. Effect of Information Literacy

Though 83% of librarians agree that information literacy affects college graduation rates and 97% believe that this skill set contributes to success in the workforce, 44% think that their library does not support information literacy instruction as much as it should. A recent ProQuest survey of over 200 librarians from university, community college, high school and public libraries collected this insight and delved deeper into what librarians are doing to drive development of information literacy. "Overall, lack of budget and limited staffing were reported as some of the greatest obstacles for doing as much as they would like to drive development of this important skill set," said Kevin Stehr, ProQuest Vice President of North American Sales. Effect of demonetization

A farmer in West Midnapore district of West Bengal has put on hold plan to set up a computer centre in the library set up by him in his village after two sweet shop owners, who had promised to supply five machines, backed out in the aftermath of demonetisation, says a report by Naresh Jana published in The Telegraph. Himanka Sekhar Pal, a resident of Babla village in Dantan, runs the library which loans out books and study material to the poor students. The 63-year-old farmer's philanthropy started after his 24-year-old son committed suicide in 2005. "My only son had fallen into bad company and dropped out of school when he was in Class XII. I tried to bring him back to the mainstream but failed. This led to a distance between us. One day in 2005, he misbehaved with a neighbour and I rebuked him in public. Soon after, he committed suicide", Pal said. "My son was in coma for

three months before his death. During those months, I used to sit beside him and think how to turn children of our village into educated youths and good human beings," Pal said. This led him to start the library, which he named as Vidyasagar Pathagar, in a small room in his house with donations from villagers. "It started with 100 books and now, I have over 1,000 of them. I also keep reference and guide books for students of Classes IX to XII. There are books on general knowledge too. All this would not have been possible without the help of the villagers," he said. Pal takes a paltry sum as fee from the readers. But the actual donation has been coming from 51 farmers in his village, who have been paying him Rs 100 each every month. Since the demonetisation, the farmers have stopped paying Pal. The sweet shop owners, who had offered Pal to donate the computers, have since backed out saying their sales had dipped over the past month. Power from Air for Internet

Even the smallest Internet-connected devices typically need a battery or power cord. Not for much longer. Technology that lets gadgets work and communicate using only energy harvested from nearby TV, radio, cell-phone, or Wi-Fi signals is headed toward commercialization, according to an article by Mark Harris published in MIT Technology Review. The University of Washington researchers who developed the technique have demonstrated Internet-connected temperature and motion sensors, and even a camera, powered that way. Transferring power wirelessly is not a new trick. But getting a device without a conventional power source to communicate is harder, because generating radio signals is very powerintensive and the airwaves harvested from radio, TV, and other telecommunication technologies hold little energy. Shyamnath Gollakota and his colleague Joshua Smith have proved that weak radio signals can indeed provide all an Internet gadget needs, using a principle called backscattering. Instead of generating original signals, one of their devices selectively reflects incoming radio waves to construct a new signal - a bit like an injured hiker sending an SOS message using the sun and a mirror. A gadget using the technique absorbs some energy from the signal it is modifying to power its own circuits. One version of the University of Washington technology, dubbed passive Wi-Fi, is being commercialized through a spin-off company, Jeeva Wireless. It lets battery-free gadgets connect with conventional devices such as computers and smartphones by backscattering Wi-Fi signals. In tests, prototype passive Wi-Fi devices have beamed data as far as 100 feet and made connections through walls. Doing that requires altering the software of a Wi-Fi access point to generate an extra signal for passive Wi-Fi devices to use, very slightly increasing its power consumption. Restrictions for e-mail providers proposed

Email providers will have to guarantee the confidentiality of customer conversations under new proposals, according to an article by Amelia Heathman published on http://www.wired.co.uk/ website. The European Commission has proposed new legislation to ensure the stronger privacy of individuals when it comes to using online messaging services including WhatsApp, iMessage and Gmail. Věra Jourová, Commissioner for Justice, Consumers and Gender Equality, said the new strategy would "facilitate international data exchanges in the global digital economy and promote high data protection standards worldwide." Under the proposal, tech companies including Google and Facebook will have to guarantee the confidentiality of their customers' conversations and make sure to get their consent before tracking them online, something that is used to serve customers with personalised ads. At the moment, email services such as Gmail can scan customers' emails to serve them targeted ads without explicit agreement from the users. The proposal would do away with this, something that online services are worried about as this could reduce their advertising revenue stream. In Quest of Superlatives

Which is the largest library in the world? this is one of the common questions often asked in interviews for recruitment of library/information professionals. Every professional knows that it is Library of Congress in USA. But this is not the only superlative relating to libraries. There are many such superlatives about which we are not much aware of. For example, the longest overdue book, issued to Robert Walpole of England from Sidney Sussex College library in 1668, was returned after 288 years, without fine, while the largest overdue fine of \$345 was paid by Emily Canellos-Simms of USA for returning a book of poetry Days and Deeds, which she returned to Kewanee Public Library after 47 years; the highest (230.9 m) library from ground level is located on the 60th floor of the J W Marriot Hotel at Tomorrow Square in Shanghai, China; the most sold copyrighted book and the most stolen book in the world is Guinness World Records; the largest book in the world is This the Prophet Mohamed, which measures 16.40ft x 26.44ft, weighs 3,306 lbs and consists of 429 pages, while the smallest book is Teeny Ted from Turnip *Town*, which is a 30 micro-tablet book carved on a pure crystalline silicon page, measuring just 70 micrometres x 100 micrometres; and the largest atlas is Earth Platinum Atlas, which measures 6.08ft x 4.75ft, with a depth of 2.36 inches and weight of 4411b and so on.

But then, where can we find such superlatives or records relating to libraries and their resources and users? The first source that comes to our mind is *Guinness World Records* (previously known as *Guinness Book of Records* and *Guinness Book of World Records*). Yes, there is no doubt that it is an important information source in this regard, but its scope is wider and it includes records in innumerable other fields. Another similar initiative is *Golden Book of Records*, which too has several entries relating to libraries, such as largest research library in the world (New York Public Library), largest library in the world (British Library, though *Guinness World Records* gives this credit to Library of Congress) and also several entries relating to books. But its scope is also quite wide and records relating to library and books included in it are not significant in number.

Interestingly, a British librarian Godfrey Oswald, who has worked as a cataloguer, database searcher and library manager, being interested in identifying superlatives in his own field, started to do research in this area which culminated in introduction of a 'Library World Record' section in 2002 in the free Info Connect Library and Information Science Directory website created by him in 1995 and later publication of a record book entirely devoted to library and related fields, entitled *Library World Records* in 2004, which was revised in 2009. A new edition of the book is scheduled to be published next month. His record book provides hundreds of intriguing and comprehensive facts about ancient and modern books, manuscripts and libraries around the world, e.g.:

- What are the names of oldest public libraries in all of the different continents of the world?
- In which year was the first CD-ROM book released?
- When was the first major computer database used in libraries?
- What are the titles of the largest, heaviest, smallest and most expensive books ever published?
- What are the titles of the largest journals and magazines in the world?
- Which libraries have the most expensive budgets in the world?
- Which countries publish the largest number of books in the world?
- What are the names of the oldest surviving papyrus, vellum, parchment and paper manuscripts?
- What is the name of the very first printed book in the world to have page numbers?
- What are the names of the first books and illuminated manuscripts to be printed in colour?and so on.

Naturally, this book is often termed as the Guinness Book of World Records on libraries and books.

In India too some efforts have been made to create similar record books. *Limca Book of Records*, first brought out in 1990, includes library related records under Education category. Some of the entries relate to largest library in

India (National Library, Kolkata); first Little Magazine Library in Kolkata; first Comic Book Library in Mumbai; record of highest new member registration in a library (in a day) held by Pais Friends Library in Dombivli, Thane, Maharashtra; only library with clippings incorporated in books (The Phoenix Library, Pune) and so on. India Book of *Records* is another initiative started in 2004, but it specializes in the fields which mostly are not included in any organized sport. It has one entry on mobile library (packed inside a box) introduced in a Gujarat school and a few entries relating to books, but not specifically about any library or related fields. Another similar initiative is Asia Book of *Records*, but it does not cover many records relating to library and related fields. It has only recorded the first international journal on poetry Kavita Sagar and the first book of Indian Constitution in poetry form. There are two more similar initiatives, viz., Indian Achiever Book of *Records* and *World Records India*. The former does not seem to have any entry relating to library or related fields, while the latter has one entry relating to public library set up by a child and a few entries relating to books.

Obviously, there is dearth of any book specifically for library and book related records in India. We eagerly look forward for any young enthusiast who can take up this responsibility so that we can also boast of having a *Library India Records*.
