PONDICHERRY UNIVERSITY

03. Auroville Matrimandir

On 28 February 1968, on a piece of barren wasteland approximately 12 kilometres to the north of Puducherry, young people from 124 countries poured earth from their native lands into a lotus-shaped urn. The urn, a symbolic gesture of unity, was placed in the notional centre of a future township. Auroville, a city of the future-under founder Mira Alfassa, the 'Mother' and spiritual collaborator of philosopher Sri Aurobindo-had come into being.

04. Chunnambar boathouse

A creek borders the Chunnambar boathouse on one side, and lush green meadows replete with waterfall backdrops that complete the exquisiteness and elegance of the place. The pristine sand and turquoise water are a relaxing experience and call for thousands of tourists and locals to enjoy a day picnic with their dear ones.









The south boulevard at Subbayah Salai houses this famous church in Pondicherry, which was constructed by French missionaries during the 1700s. It's a classic example of Gothic splendour and one must visit this to experience its inner beauty and peace. The church beautifully depicts the events from the life of Christ through its stunning glass panels. It also contains spectacular glass pictures of twenty-eight saints, the great devotees Jesus Christ

06. Manakula Vinayagar Temple

Dedicated to the god Ganesa, it is a popular pilgrimage site and tourist destination in Puducherry. The temple is of considerable antiquity and predates French occupation of the territory. During the tenure of Dupleix, there were attempts to destroy the temple, but it was spared owing to strong protests from the Hindu population and the threat of British and Maratha invasion of the territory

07. Mamallapuram Temple

Mamallapuram is a historic city and UNESCO World Heritage site in Tamil Nadu, India. During the reign of the Pallava dynasty, between the 3rd century CE and 7th century CE, it became an important centre of art, architecture and literature. Mahabalipuram was already a thriving sea port on the Bay of Bengal before this time. A significant amount of coins and other artefacts excavated from this region also indicate a pre-existing trade relation with the Romans even before it became a part of the Pallava Empire.

08. Pichavaram Mangrove Forest

Mangrove forests, also called mangrove swamps, mangrove thickets or mangals, are productive wetlands that occur in coastal intertidal zones. Mangrove forests grow mainly at tropical and subtropical latitudes because mangroves cannot withstand freezing temperatures. There are about 80 different species of mangroves, all of which grow in areas with low-oxygen soil, where slow-moving waters allow fine sediments to accumulate.





09. Chidambaram Nataraja Temple

Thillai Nataraja Temple, also referred as the Chidambaram Nataraja Temple, is a Hindu temple dedicated to Nataraja the form of Shiva This temple is located in Chidambaram, Tamil Nadu, India. The temple is glorified in the Naalayira Divya Prabandham, the early mediaeval Pundarikavalli Thayar. This temple has ancient roots and a Shiva shrine existed at the site when the town was known as Thillai. Chidambaram, the name of the city literally means "stage of consciousness". The temple architecture symbolizes the connection between the arts and spirituality, creative activity and the divine

10. French War Memorial

The French War Memorial in Puducherry, India is a war memorial dedicated to residents of French India who died for the country during the First World War. It is on Goubert Avenue in Puducherry, located opposite to the Gandhi statue

11. Paradise Beach
