Ranganathan Lecture on Technical Writing: Brief Report

The 21st IASLIC-Ranganathan Memorial Lecture was held at IASLIC Seminar Hall on May 21, 2018. Prof. S. Seetharama, Former Professor, DRTC, Bangalore, delivered the lecture on the topic 'Why, What and How of Technical Writing. Prof. Amitabha Chatterjee, Former Professor, DLIS, Jadavpur University, Kolkata, and Editor, IASLIC Newsletter, presided over the programme. At the outset, Dr. Nitai Roychaudhury, Joint Secretary, IASLIC, introduced the Speaker. Prof. Chatterjee, in his introductory remarks said that though Ranganathan did not write much on technical writing, he himself was a master technical writer. Through his writings he demonstrated how technical papers should be written and how the text of the paper should be organized and how different sections and sub-sections of a technical paper should be numbered. He also mentioned how late Prof. A Neelameghan, in his book 'Presentation of Ideas in Technical Writing' had shown that most of the principles enunciated by Ranganathan for working in different planes in the context of classification could be profitably employed in technical writing too.

In his introduction, Prof. Seetharama shared the memories of his golden days at DRTC, Bangalore, both as a student and as a teacher, specially his experiences of working with Ranganathan. He said that Ranganathan was a man who was always very keen about perfection in every work. He could easily motivate others, specially the students and colleagues. Ranganathan used to go for a morning walk everyday in the DRTC campus and some students used to accompany him. A couple of rounds within the campus used to take two hours as discussions continued.

While speaking on the theme of his lecture, Prof. Seetharama referred to Rudyard Kipling's idea of six honest friends - What, Why, When, How, Where and Who - and

said that answers to these would help one to plan an effective and appropriate technical communication. He then went on to discuss the characteristics and principles of technical writing and the problems that might be faced by a writer in using appropriate language in a technical communication. He mentioned about aberrations that might occur in technical writing and the reasons behind them. Prof. Seetharama also provided some tips for good writing and stressed on ensuring content reliability in the writing. He suggested rules to be followed in relation to style of presentation and provided basic guidelines for preparing a technical paper. He also explained various steps in technical writing and the structure of a technical paper. Finally, he presented some important points that should be seriously considered by a writer of technical paper.

In his concluding remarks, Prof. Chatterjee stressed on the importance of technical writing for LIS professionals. He gave references of some useful books written by Prof. Seetharama and also informed about Prof. Seetharama's recent book published by IASLIC. He suggested that IASLIC should conduct short-term courses on technical writing. Prof. Arjun Dasgupta, Former Professor, DLIS, University of Calcutta, proposed a vote of thanks. A good number of students, research scholars, library and information professionals and LIS teachers, including some former students of Prof. Seetharama, were present on the occasion.

Librarians' Day Celebration: Brief Report

IASLIC, jointly with Bengal Library Association (BLA) and West Bengal Public Library Employees Association (WBPLEA), and in collaboration with Raja Rammohan Roy Library Foundation (RRRLF), Kolkata, and Heritage Institute of Technology (HIT), Kolkata, observed Librarians' Day to commemorate 126th birth anniversary of Dr. S R Ranganathan through a function held on August 12, 2018 at the Vivekananda Auditorium of HIT.

The inaugural session started with the opening song by Smt. Madhushree Ghosh followed by lighting of ceremonial lamp by Hon'ble Chief Justice (Retd.) Shri Chittotosh Mookerjee and other dignitaries present on the dais. All the dignitaries were then felicitated on behalf of the organizers as also on behalf of Heritage Institute of Technology, Prof. B B Paira, Advisor, Higher Education, Kalyan Bharati Trust, welcomed the dignitaries and the participants. Shri Gautam Goswami, General Secretary, Bengal Library Association, in his address, highlighted the role of BLA in library movement and reminded the responsibilities of librarians in developing reading habit in the ever changing society. Shri Sajal Kanti Goswami, General Secretary, IASLIC, explained the significance of Librarians' Day and mentioned the contributions of Dr. S R Ranganathan in the development of library profession. Shri Shibaprasad Chakraborty, General Secretary, West Bengal Public Library Employees Association (WBPLEA), threw light on the present condition of public libraries in the state and how library services were being hampered for want of staff. Justice Mookerjee, in his inaugural address, stressed on the importance or reading books. He said that libraries in

our society were developed not only as learning resource centres but also as places for exchange of ideas and sharing of views among the citizens. The Guest of Honour, Dr. Barun Mukherjee, former MP and former President BLA and IASLIC, in his address, stressed on the contributions of Ranganathan in the field of LIS. Another Guest of Honour, Dr. Arun Kumar Chakraborty, Director General of RRRLF and National Library, gave a brief account of the activities of RRRLF. Prof. N. R. Satyanarayana, Former Professor, DLIS, University of Lucknow, and Vice-President of IASLIC, threw light on some incidents in the life of Dr. Ranganathan. Dr. Binod Bihari Das, Advisor, Library, HIT, Kolkata, in his address, highlighted the steady growth and development of a good library system in the Heritage Group of Institution with the support of the concerned authorities. In his presidential address, Dr. J N Satpathi, President of IASLIC, gave a brief account of Librarians' Day celebrations since 1990. He also mentioned about the reading habit, reading culture and reading environment in libraries abroad as observed by him in some countries. Prof. K P Majumder, Vice-President, IASLIC and BLA, proposed a vote of thanks.

The inaugural session was followed by a discussion session, chaired by Dr. Bimal Chattopadhyay, President, BLA, in which three eminent speakers, viz., Prof. Subol Chandra Biswas, former Professor, DLIS, Burdwan University, Burdwan; Dr. Arun Kumar Chakraborty, Director General, RRRLF and National Library; and Shri Arup Roychoudhury, former Deputy Librarian, Indian Statistical Institute, Kolkata; expressed their views on the theme 'Librarianship in Information Age'. Initiating the discussion, Prof. Subal Chandra Biswas, highlighted the role of ICT in day-to-day life as well as in library and information profession. He also pointed out the role of smart phone in making our daily life easier. Dr. Arun Kumar Chakraborty shared his experiences about readers' behaviour and attitude in the National Library and some other research institute libraries. Shri Arup Roychaudhury spoke on the topic from three different angles - application of technology, information obesity and librarianship in the present economic-political system. According to Shri Raychaudhury, library automation was a regular activity involving huge expenditures. On the other hand there was severe fund crunch in libraries affecting purchase of books and periodicals. He pointed out that with exponential growth of information, a good amount of junk information were appearing affecting the library and information system and turning information rich to information obese. Finally, he said, in most of the education institutes teaching-learning was not at all library oriented and parents were more concerned about grades than the knowledge obtained by their children. In this situation the librarians could hardly do anything, he added. At the end Shri Bimal Chattopadhyay summarised the views of different speakers and also thanked them for enlightening the audience. He also thanked all concerned for the success of the programme.

More than 400 LIS professionals, including teachers, librarians and students attended the function.

Study Circle Meeting on LIS Subject Descriptors

The 333rd IASLIC Study Circle Meeting was held on May 17, 2018 at 6 pm in the Seminar Room of the Association. In this meeting, Dr. Sonali Dapsi, Librarian, Raja Peary Mohan College, Uttarpara, Hooghly, delivered a lecture on 'Study of Subject Descriptors in LIS articles published in India: a folksonomical approach'. The meeting was chaired by Shri Biswabaran Guha, Former Deputy Director, Raja Rammohun Roy Library Foundation, Kolkata.

In her lecture, Dr. Dapsi discussed about the keyword usage in articles published in Indian LIS journals during 1998-2012. The analysis of keywords was based on 3604 articles in 322 volumes of 13 journals published by LIS associations and institutions, and LIS departments of reputed universities in India. Her study revealed that out of 3604 keywords, 1958 were uncontrolled. This included the popular terms like - Information Communication Technology, Authorship Pattern, Scientometrics, Bibliometric Studies, Citation Analysis, Information Literacy, Institutional Repository, etc. Dr. Dapsi opined that after repeated use of the same keywords, uncontrolled terms would be accepted as controlled terms in due course of time.

In the question-answer session, some members of the audience raised different points. Dr. J N Satpathi, President, IASLIC, said that use of terminology in science subjects was not a problem, but it was a common problem in social science subjects. Ms. Moumita Ash, Convener, Library Service Division, IASLIC, stated that selection of uncontrolled keywords was not always due to the negligence on the author's part. There was also lack of tools to control the vocabulary. A few more members of the audience also mentioned about lack of mechanism to control vocabulary in LIS. Dr. Sudip Ranjan Hatua, Convener, Study Circle Division, said that folksonomy was an interesting and new topic in the field of LIS research. Dr. Dapsi, had been awarded Ph D degree in 2017 by Rabindra Bharati University on the same topic, he added.

In his presidential remarks, Shri Biswabaran Guha thanked the speaker for her interesting presentation and expressed his concern over use of uncontrolled keywords. The meeting ended with a vote of thanks proposed by Dr. Gurudas Ghosh, Convener, Information Service Division, IASLIC. The meeting was attended by a good number of library and information science professionals and a large number of LIS students.

Little Free Library at Trichy

After initiatives like 'wall of happiness' and open gym, the City Corporation of Trichy is going to launch 'Little Free Library', an initiative aimed at nurturing reading habit and exchange of books among locals, says a The Times of India report. The civic body will establish a roadside facility for the public to sit and spend time reading books on a land in Officers Colony Road near Trichy General Hospital. The facility will have at least 13 benches for visitors to spend time reading books and 2.3m wide walking tracks. The corporation officials said that shelves would be placed in the open library for residents to deposit the books available in excess. "The open library-cum park concept in residential localities will help residents connect with each other. Preliminary work has begun for opening the library", said N Ravichandran, Commissioner, Trichy Corporation. Thousands of Library Documents Missing

Over 11000 books and rare document have gone missing from the Karnataka Legislature Library house in Vidhan Soudha in Bengaluru, says a report by BV Shivashankar in The Times of India. Auditors from the Comptroller and Auditor General of India (CAG) have found that records of proceedings of the Mysore Representative Assembly of the erstwhile princely state, debates of the House of Commons and House of Lords of the British Parliament, and debates in the Karnataka Assembly in its early years of 1950s, are missing. While Legislature Secretary S Murthy confirmed the audit objection about the missing books, library officials, including the just-retired chief librarian Anusuya Devadiri, disputed the number. Library IT Institute for Kerala

A Library Information Technology Institute will be established by the Kerala State Library Council (KSLC) adjacent to the State Central Library at Thiruvanthapuram, says a report in *The Hindu*. The government has leased out a plot of 20 cents for a period of 30 years for the purpose. The Revenue Department, in its order issued a few months ago, handed over the plot for an annual lease rent of ₹1,000. An office complex will also be constructed by the council on the 'poramboke' land. The government decision has come in the backdrop of a long-drawn legal battle between the council and the Thiruvananthapuram Public Library Protection Council over the course of almost two decades. Effect of Library Automation

Librarians are being replaced by machines, causing

children and the elderly to miss out on books, the leading industry body, Association for Public Service Excellence (APSE), has warned, according to a report by Helena Horton in *The Daily Telegraph* (UK). A new CCTV and PIN code entry system, Open Plus, requires users to already have a library card before they can enter libraries, which allows them to open without staff. The amount of public libraries using the new technology has increased from 24 in 2016 to at least 109 today. There are worries that the new technology is replacing librarians, which could lock out children and those who are not tech-savvy. Over half of councils using Open Plus have reduced staff hours, according to an APSE report. App for TN Public Libraries

Knowing where your nearest public library is located will soon be just a click away. A mobile app, 'Public Library: Finding community libraries', was launched as a part of the first regional public library conference at the M S Swaminathan Research Foundation (MSSRF) in Chennai recently, says a report by S Poorvaja published in *The Hindu*. The e-app, which is being launched as a pilot project, will initially cover 25 district libraries and will soon be scaled up to include all the 4,600 public libraries in the State. MSSRF, the International Network of Emerging Library Innovators and the Indian Public Library Movement are jointly working with public libraries across the State for the app. With public libraries across Tamil Nadu becoming active centres for events ranging from story-telling for children, classes for civil services aspirants and even providing services such as soil testing for farmers nearby, the app will help make its users aware of what is happening in the libraries near them. "We are also working on building a database of the books that each library has so that members can browse through them on the app. We plan to make this information available in phases," said K Srinivasan from the MSSRF, who is one of the app developers. Labourers help set up Library

They call it "shiksha ka inquilab", or the education revolution. On the faded walls, with bits of plaster peeling off, are posters of Bhagat Singh and Maxim Gorky. There's a board outside that reads: "Behtar zindagi ka raasta behtar kitaabon se hokar jaata hai (The road to a good life passes through good books)." This is Shaheed Bhagat Singh Pustakalaya, a one-room library established nine months ago by workers and daily-wage labourers employed at factories in the industrial heart of Ludhiana, the hub of cycle-makers, auto-parts manufacturers and textile units, says a report by Divya Goyal in The Indian Express. With over 500 books, in Hindi and Punjabi, it's a 25-sq-yd island of change for children from the Lower Income Group (LIG) flats and slums of Jeewan Nagar, Rajiv Gandhi Colony, Dhandhari and Jamalpur, mostly populated by migrant workers and their families, and where clean drinking water and toilets are part of a daily struggle. Set up by the Karkhana Mazdoor Union, which took the lead in collecting nearly Rs 3 lakh last year to purchase LIG flat No 498 in December 2017, with two fans and a worn rug on the floor, the library was built on individual contributions ranging from Rs 100 to Rs 5,000. "A majority of the factory workers and daily-wage labourers who contributed have not studied beyond Class 8. But they want to inculcate the reading habit in their children. Most of them earn less than Rs 10,000 a month," says Lakhwinder Singh, who heads the union and manages the library. "The idea remained a dream for years because there was no space. This small flat was bought from contributions... sometimes it gets difficult to accommodate everyone but that's all we could afford. Once the flat was purchased, we started buying books, we got some through donations," he says. There are no reading charges at the library- just Rs 50 for an annual card that will let readers take books home, two at a time. "The charge is to ensure that they are responsible and return the books on time. For these children, a library card is a prized possession, they preserve it like a trophy," says Singh. NDLI to collaborate with top DLs

The National Digital Library of India (NDLI) is all set to collaborate with several top digital libraries form across the world. Giving this information in a written reply in Rajya Sabha recently, Minister of State (HRD), Dr. Satya Pal Singh, said that NDLI had entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with British Library for integrating contents of its "Two Centuries of Indian Print Project", says an NDTV report. Apart from this, NDLI is also working closely with European Foundation (Digital Library of EU) in creating a platform for content and technology interchange between over a dozen digital libraries of the world. Remains of Oldest German PL Discovered

The remains of the oldest public library in Germany, a building erected almost two millennia ago that may have housed up to 20,000 scrolls, have been discovered in the middle of Cologne, says a report by Alison Ford in *The Guardian*. The walls were first uncovered in 2017, during an excavation on the grounds of a Protestant church in the centre of the city. Archaeologists knew they were of Roman origin, with Cologne being one of Germany's oldest cities, founded by the Romans in 50 AD under the name Colonia. But the discovery of niches in the walls, measuring approximately 80cm by 50cm, was, initially, mystifying. "It took us some time to match up the parallels - we could see the niches were too small to bear statues inside. But what they are - a kind of cupboards for the scrolls," said Dr. Dirk

Schmitz from the Roman-Germanic Museum of Cologne. "They are very particular to libraries - you can see the same ones in the library at Ephesus." It is not clear how many scrolls the library would have held, but it would have been "quite huge - may be 20,000", said Schmitz. The building would have been slightly smaller than the famed library at Ephesus, which was built in 117 AD. He described the discovery as "really incredible - a spectacular find". "It dates from the middle of the second century and is at a minimum the earliest library in Germany, and perhaps in the north-west Roman provinces," he said. "Perhaps there are a lot of Roman towns that have libraries, but they haven't been excavated. If we had not just found the foundations, we wouldn't have known it was a library. It was because it had walls, with the niches, that we could tell." The building would have been used as a public library, Schmitz said. Library opens Door to Transgender

In a ground-breaking move, Government Pandit Deen Dayal Upadhyay Divisional Public Library of Kota has become the state's first and the country's second public library to open its door for the LGBT (lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender) community, says a report by Aabshar H Quazi in *The Hindustan Times*. The first public library to offer membership to LGBT community is in Kerala. The Kota library, which has added a column for the third gender in its membership form, has already issued its lifetime membership to a transgender, Sahiba (42), a resident of the city. "Education is a right which had been always denied to us. We suffered discrimination the most at educational institutions. To gain membership in a library and to borrow books had been my long-cherished dream," said Sahiba, who has passed Class 7 and reads newspapers daily. "It is a huge recognition for us to be part of a library and many people would be benefited by this decision,' Sahiba added. Shahiba said that had the library opened its door for the community earlier, many of them would have joined it by now. New One Way Broadcast App

A new one way broadcast mobile app - YouWe -- enabling users to send text, images, video and audio clips to large number of followers has been launched, says a report by V Sajeevkumar in *The Hindu*. "The messages can be sent to the followers publicly as well as shared with a variety of other social networking platforms. It is a one way broadcast app and no one can post anything against it. At the same time any number of followers can read the messages," said K Shankar, the founder of the app. After downloading the app, people can choose to create a group with their select panel from the different type of topics

suggested by the app like news, updates, celebrities, entertainment, sports, etc. and post messages on that subject. Unlike the Twitter, here multiple persons of panel can post messages with video, audio or images. The followers can view all created pages and can follow pages of their interest, Shankar, a Kochi based media professional, said. It is secure as the followers cannot get the phone numbers of the admin or panel members, who, in turn, cannot access the phone numbers of the followers. The admins can know only the number of followers and they cannot block or remove any user who has the freedom to follow or un-follow. The app works on the android platform, he said. Library Animals!

As a librarian will you allow any animal to enter your library or issue a library card in its name? Your answer will be an emphatic 'No-o-o-o-o!'. You may even think that it is a ridiculous question. But it is not so in many libraries. For example, library cats are very common so much so that these have even got an entry in Wikipedia, which says that 'library cats' are domesticated cats that live in public libraries worldwide. The association of cats with libraries dates to antiquity, when libraries in temples of ancient Egypt had cats-in-residence for rodent control. The association continued in the Middle Ages, into the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, and up to the present day. Among the bookish feline, a cat known as Dewey, a resident of Streator Public Library in Illinois, USA, is possibly the most famous personality of its kind, on whom a documentary film has been made in Japan.

Another animal species that can be found in libraries in many western countries is canines i.e. dogs. Some dogs accompany their masters who are differently-abled, such as persons who are blind or have visual disability, persons who are deaf or hard of hearing, persons having autism, persons with mobility or dexterity disabilities, and persons with psychiatric disability. These dogs, known as

service dogs, guide, protect and give different kinds of support to their masters. Several libraries in USA have formulated guidelines for patrons visiting libraries with service dogs. There are some other dogs known as reading education assistance dogs, which are invited to the library, specially for children readers, who read stories with dogs serving as companions or listeners since children are psychologically attached to the pet dogs.

Nevertheless, cats and dogs are not the only animals which are found in libraries. Erin Bartnett, a Brooklyn based fiction editor, has mentioned about "ten animals which have broken into the library" in a post on electricliterature.com website. Among these, she has mentioned about a British owl which had a very special relationship with the library at the University of Bath. Its job was to keep other birds out of the way. Territorial seagulls were nesting on the university campus, and many feared for the safety of the humans on the ground. Professor Yoda the Owl, as it was named, swooped onto the campus a couple of times a week with its handler, and cleared out the seagulls. In exchange for its services, it was given its own library card embellished with its photograph.

Julie H Case, in her post on travelandleisure.com website, mentioned about two libraries in Portugal where bats are welcome guests, allowed to stay for the bugeating - and, by extension, manuscript-preserving services they provide. One such library is Joanina Library of the University of Coimbra, where a colony of common pipistrelle bats has made its home behind the bookshelves of the library, emerging at nightfall to consume flies and gnats and other pests before swooping out of the library windows in search of water. The service they provide is indispensable: They eat insects in the library that might otherwise feed on manuscript pages, Ms. Case says. Some 200km to the south, just northwest of Lisbon, another colony of indoor-outdoor bats is in residence at the 300-year-old Library at the National Palace of Mafra. Come nightfall, they swoop among the monastic-royal library's valuable collection of incunabula (books printed prior to 1501 AD).

But not all animals that ventured into some libraries were welcome guests, nor were they of any benefit to the libraries, in which they landed, or their users. For example, as mentioned by Ms. Bartnett, a majestic hawk was unwelcome when it entered into the Library of Congress. This "juvenile female raptor" stayed in the main reading room of the Jefferson Library for a week until it got hungry. The trick for getting it out? Bringing more birds into the library and setting them up in a trap. Similarly, another unwelcome guest to a library was a black bear that "bumbled its way" into a tree to hang out outside the Hilton Branch of the Metropolitan library in New Jersey, USA. Fortunately, it could be safely relocated as not to be an object of fear for the users entering the branch library.

In our country too there might have been some animal

"guests" in some libraries, but they were mostly unwelcome. There is also possibly no rules or guidelines even for service animals for the differently-abled people. Should we also not frame a policy for allowing animals into a library for helping and supporting differently-abled users or for giving company to willing children when they read?
