### Indian Library Science Abstracts [ILSA] -Volume 45-49 (2011-2015) - Just Published

Indian Library Science Abstracts (ILSA), being brought out by IASLIC since 1967, is the only national abstracting and indexing journal of India in the field of library and information Science. Due to the phenomenal growth of LIS literature in India in English as well as regional languages and the lack of volunteer professionals it has become a herculean task to collect, organize

and compile data for the ILSA. The last cumulative volume (Vols. 40-44, 2006-2010) was published in 2018, the print copies as well as e-copies (in CD) of which are available for sale at IASLIC Office.

ILSA Volumes: 45-49 (2011-2015) published in July, 2023. The volume consists of 1365 entries from 17 journals and 6 conference proceedings. Complete bibliographical description of the abstracted document as furnished in the source journal has been provided in order to facilitate the users to identify the document. The volume consists of two parts: Main or Classified Part and Index Part. Entries in the main/classified part are primarily arranged according to the classified order by adopting 22nd ed. of DDC.

We humbly acknowledge the patronage of the honourable members of the Editorial Board. We also gratefully acknowledge commercial and academic publishers, LIS schools, research institutes, professional associations, library and information science professionals for their encouragement and support in getting data from various sources distributed in different states of India. The team hopes that ILSA will be an authentic and comprehensive surrogate of Indian intellectual output in Library and Information Science.

### **2nd Announcement**

The IASLIC 33rd All India Conference 2023 will be organised in collaboration with the Department of Library & Information Science, Pondicherry University, Puducherry, India and is scheduled to be held at the Pondicherry University, Puducherry, during December 7-9, 2023.

No library (or information centre or knowledge resource centre), how much big it may be, can be self-sufficient to fully satisfy its users, if it functions in isolation. Cooperation and collaboration among these organizations can be of a great help in rendering effective library and information services by enhancing the satisfaction level of their user communities. Realizing the benefits of collaboration, libraries have been undertaking resource sharing initiatives since long. Consequently, the concept of Collaborative Librarianship has emerged which focuses on the partnership and sharing of resources and expertise between libraries. Collaboration and partnership among libraries started with the extension of inter-library loan facilities. Automation of libraries and advancement in networking technology brought an opportunity for developing library networks which created modern avenues for resource sharing. Later, the concept of library consortia was conceived, which became very popular and several library consortia started functioning at national and international levels. Increasingly libraries are feeling the urgency to develop and exploit library collaboration/ partnerships, for which it is necessary to think widely and creatively about new types of, and potentials for, such collaboration/partnerships. Hence, IASLIC has selected 'Collaborative Librarianship' as the main theme of its 33rd All India Conference. - 1. Contributed papers must have to be of qualitative value for publishing in the **IASLIC Special Publication** (ISSN 0972-3668) Volumen-60, a peer-reviewed post-Conference publication. A generalised presentation, thus, should be avoided.
- 2. Full research paper within 2500 words (not more than 10 pages of A4 paper-size), along with an informative abstract (between 300 and 400 words), typed in double space on single side, in Times New Roman 12pt font size, with margin of 1.5" on all sides should be submitted in **duplicate (hard copy) by October 07, 2023.**

- Authors' declaration in prescribed format for the conference must be signed by all author(s) sequentially and submitted along with the full paper indicating distinctly the sub-theme and topic of the paper.
- 4. Declaration by the author(s) should be made separately in a hardcopy that the paper has not been sent elsewhere for publication/ presentation.
- 5. Softcopy of the full paper composed in .doc / .docx format should be submitted as an attachment through e-mail to iaslic.sem@gmail.com .
- For bibliographical references and citations, contributors are required to follow strictly the IASLIC Authorship Manual including Standard and Specification

The paper should be accompanied with an amount of Rs 1000.00 (Rupees one thousand only) as paper submission fee which will be adjusted with the Registration Fee only by the Organising Secretary subject to the production of the respective original payment receipt of IASLIC. If the paper is not accepted, the amount will be refunded.

- 11. There will be provision for Poster presentation. All papers accepted for poster presentation will be allocated time for display of full papers. Abstracts of all papers accepted for poster presentation will be included in the pre-Conference volume.
- 12. There will be a provision for the Best Poster Presentation Award which is likely to be included in the post-Conference volume. Other Poster papers will not be published in the post-conference volume.
- 13. Accepted papers which are presented in the Conference, will only be considered for publishing in the Post-conference IASLIC Special Publication (ISSN 0972-3668) Volume-60 subject to its merit of publication. IASLIC Special Publication 2023 is likely to be published within three months after the conference.
- 14. All registered participants will receive Post-Conference IASLIC Special Publication (ISSN 0972-3668) Volume-60 free of cost from IASLIC office.
- 15. Those who wish to purchase the volume through post, an amount of Rs.150/- will be charged for packaging and postage in addition to its cost price.

### Foundation Day Celebration - A brief report

The 69th Foundation Day was celebrated on September 3, 2023. Foundation Day Lecture was delivered by Mr S B Banerjee, former Deputy Manager (Information), Hindustan Paper Corporation Ltd, Kolkata and Former Vice-President, IASLIC Zone 6 on "New Age Librarianship: Strategies and Strives to Formulate and Pursue for Attainment of the Inclusive Growth and Propriety of the Knowledge Economy". The program was chaired by Dr J N Satpathi, former President of IASLIC.

Welcoming the speaker, the chairperson and the participants Ms Moumita Ash, Joint Secretary, IASLIC mentioned the six decades long history of IASLIC as a prominent National Association and contribution of the founding father of IASLIC in the development of librarianship in India. In his introductory address, Dr J.N. Satpathi discussed the genesis of IASLIC and present activities of IASLIC. Prof Banerjee evaluated librarianship in the context of changing academic and industrial information needs. He shared his personal professional experiences about personalized reference services in the industrial sector. He emphasized on redesigning library services to fulfill user information needs in the knowledge economy. He mentioned the importance of user studies and information seeking behavior analysis for shaping new library services.

Finally, Mr Abhijit Kumar, General Secretary IASLIC proposed a vote of thanks.

This policy statement aims to outline key considerations for the use of these technologies in the library sector and suggest the roles which libraries should strive to take on in a society with growing AI integration.

AI technologies can have deeply transformative capabilities, and their power can be put to the service of public welfare and innovation. With necessary preparations – and regard for ethical concerns and current limitations – libraries can responsibly use AI technologies to advance their social mission

### · Academia.edu

In a similar vein, Academia.edu is basically used in social sciences and humanities. It allows users to create a personal academic profile, upload papers, request feedback, follow researchers, send personal messages to other researchers, and view analytics on their papers, among other things.

### • ORCID- Best for Digital Identification

ORCID is one of the best online platforms that give you with a persistent digital identification (an ORCID iD) that you own and control, and that allows you to be distinguished from every other researcher. You can link your personal profile to your scholarly work, such as affiliations, grants, publications, peer review, and other accomplishments, by creating a professional profile.

### • Scopus Author Identifier (Elsevier)

Some authors have names that are similar to one another.

or their names can appear in different ways in different publications. The Scopus Author Identifier distinguishes between authors with similar names by assigning a unique number to each author in Scopus and grouping all of the documents written by that author under that number.

### • Publons (Clarivate Analytics)

Similar to Elsevier's identifier, the Clarivate Analytics identifier establishes a link between authors and their published articles to satisfy their research interests. This application makes use of the ResearcherID system, which was originally developed for Web of Science.

### ResearchGate

In addition to publishing journal articles, conference papers, posters, data, and code to an online repository, ResearchGate also provides researchers with the opportunity to collaborate with other researchers. Those who publish on ResearchGate also receive metrics on their work, such as the number of times their papers have been read and cited by other ResearchGate users.

### Xing

### Chennai to soon get a Museum of Tamil Print Culture

The Roja Muthiah Research Library at Chennai suburb Taramani aims to open a Museum of Print Culture that aims to showcase the over 400yearold history of Tamil printed word. Through this museum, the library aims to build awareness about the milestones in Tamil print culture and how it transformed society. The museum plans to carry all significant print Tamil literature from the beginning of its

evolution, says Sundar Ganesan, Director of Rojah Muthiah Research Library.

The first ever printed book in Tamil was the abridged version of the Bible, called Thambiram Vanakkam, published in 1578. Other significant works published in Tamil include the first edition of Tirukkural, printed in 1812, which incidentally the library possesses. It also has the first edition of Tolkappiyam (an ancient grammar text), and other Sangam literature texts.
